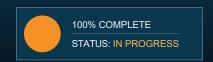

In preparation to effectively teach students with disabilities, candidates in the alternate route Teacher of English as a Second Language program must successfully complete 'EDUC-5300: Curriculum, Evaluation and the Learner.' This course covers theories of learning, child/adolescent development, curriculum, assessment procedures and instruments, classroom management, diverse cultures and learners, state standards, and the creation of positive classroom cultures. Candidates in the alternate route 'Early Childhood Education' program must successfully complete 'EC-5111: Designing and Managing Classroom Environments for Early Childhood Special Education.' In this course, students explore the policies and procedures for identifying children with special needs and understanding the relevant laws.

b. Participate as a member of individualized education program teams, as defined in section 614(d)(1)(B) of the *Individuals with Disabilities Education Act*.

Alternate route candidates are the teacher of record. They are mentored or supervised by tenured faculty in their district while completing the requisite coursework for certification. All candidates must complete a 50-hour pre-service workshop, which includes 20 hours of observations. Candidates are required to observe classroom instruction with students who require an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) and are trained to create IEPs in their own classroom.

c. Effectively teach students who are limited English proficient.

Through coursework, Early Childhood Education candidates learn about various developmentally, linguistically, and culturally appropriate forms of assessment to promote learning and development in young children. Similarly, Teacher of English as a Second Language candidates examine cultural, cognitive, and communicative processes that impact learning within second language learning contexts. Candidates in both programs develop cultural sensitivity as they learn from others with diverse backgrounds and learning styles.
