## Juniors: 60 to 90 Credits

- **Start Building Your Resume,** as a junior, you should secure an internship and start building your resume with career-related experience.
- **Explore Career Options**; if you are unsure what you would like to do with your degree, start looking for career options.
- **Graduate Study**, are you interested in pursuing a master's or doctoral degree? This is the time to start thinking about what program you like to be admitted to and the requirements.
- **Graduate Exams,** most graduate programs, require entrance exams (e.g., GRE, LSATs, MCATs) if you are interested in pursuing graduate studies, now is the time to start preparing.
- Participate in campus events; extracurricular activities are an integral part of a student's resume, continue to get involved.
- Complete your FAFSA or the HESAA Alternative Financial Aid Application (for students who qualify under the Dream Act). Check your financial account to ensure you complete any requirements if selected for verification.
- Continue to get involved! Ask your advisors about honors societies, clubs, and organizations you can join.
- Continue to seek support, your GPA is very important, make sure you maintain your grades.
- Advisement: Speak with your major advisor about your career interests, possible internships, and graduate programs.
- **GRADUATION PLANNING**: Speak with your advisor about your academic plans and ensure you are aware of application deadlines and requirements for graduation. Review your Academic Progress in Student Planning to ensure you are on the right track and prepare for your senior year.
- **SEEK SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES;** some scholarships are specific to juniors; look for scholarships requirements under the financial aid page.
